

## Pupil Premium Funding

The **pupil premium** is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of children whose families are on low income, are children of Service men or women or are Looked After Children. The aim of Pupil Premium Funding is to close the achievement gap between these children and their peers.

The Pupil Premium Funding allocation for 2015/16 was: £60,066

The school spends the money to enhance the educational provision for those pupils that are entitled to it.

For 2015/2016 the money has been spent as follows:

- Classroom based support for the Premium Funded pupils during English, Maths and topic based activities. This ensures classroom based groups are smaller. The pupils work with both the teacher and LSA.
- Intervention programmes - intensive reading support programmes, writing support for a range of specific needs in different year groups, phonics support and maths intervention.
- Pastoral support for the pupils – Nurture groups in all year groups and ELSA.
- Providing additional teaching assistants to allow for smaller teaching groups.
- To help fund the additional interventions, where needed, to help support specific learning needs.
- To subsidise school trips, when appropriate.
- To support pupils who require additional pastoral support, with free holiday club and other club attendance, when necessary.
- Targeted special needs support - from LSAs (led by the Inclusion Manager) for individual and group support.

### How we spend the Pupil Premium

Pupil Premium funding has the potential to have a great impact on the attainment and future life chances. In 2012/13 £26,266 was allocated as pupil premium, in 2013/14 this increased to £41,120, in 2014/15 it increased to £57,482 and this year to £60,066. We need to spend this money as effectively as possible to meet the needs of individual pupils.

Pupil premium funded interventions such as ELSA and Nurture groups demonstrated a growth in self esteem and confidence in Pupil Premium Funded Children.

Golden Time records show 89% of Pupil Premium Children lost minimal Golden Time throughout the school year and did not require any further intervention for behaviour support.
